

Hamilton Overview: Why Pest Problems Differ Across Areas

Hamilton, ON has a diverse combination of housing, industry, parks, shoreline, and hillside terrain, which means pest concerns can be quite different from one street to the next. The **Burlington border** area can also see changing pressure depending on new development, commercial activity, and whether a property sits near open land or denser residential zones. Across all these areas, older homes remain especially vulnerable because older framing, aging brickwork, and unsealed utility runs often create easy entry points.
