

Why wasps are regular around Windsor homes and businesses

If you're spotting wasps around your property in **Windsor, Ontario**, you're certainly in good company. Milder months in Southern Ontario bring more **seasonal activity** from stinging insects, especially in late summer and early fall when colonies are most active. That seasonal peak is one reason many residents and business owners need timely **pest control Windsor** support.

Windsor's climate, including its proximity to Lake Erie, can create conditions that support higher pest pressure for much of the warm season.
