

Why stink bugs are and how they show up in Hamilton homes

Stink bugs are shield-like insects that often become a pest in Ontario homes, especially when temperatures start to drop. The species most people in this region notice is the **brown marmorated stink bug**, an invasive pest known for finding warm indoor spaces as part of its **overwintering** behaviour. In Hamilton, this often means they gather on siding, around windows, and near rooflines before getting into houses and apartments through tiny **entry points**.
