

Eagle, Idaho has a way of surprising people. On paper, it sits just northwest of Boise and belongs to the larger Treasure Valley growth story. In person, it feels more layered than that. You see horse properties not far from polished retail centers, old irrigation routes near new subdivisions, and a downtown core that still tries to hold onto its small-town pulse even as traffic patterns, school enrollment, and commercial demand keep shifting upward.
