- **API Scam Mitigation:** Valve has actually continuously updated its system to prevent automated bots from assisting in prohibited transfers.

Regardless of these procedures, the market has proven resilient. When one website closes, a number of others emerge, utilizing cryptocurrencies (Bitcoin, Ethereum, GBPT) alongside or in place of direct skin deposits to bypass standard Steam trade constraints.
