

Medford does not announce itself the way Boston does. It does not need to. What it offers is denser, quieter, and, for many people, more interesting once you start paying attention. This is a city where a 19th-century house can sit a few streets from a busy commercial corridor, where a river path can change the mood of an afternoon, and where the past is not sealed behind glass so much as layered into the street grid, the architecture, and the way neighborhoods still work.

People often pass through Medford on the way to somewhere else, or think of it mainly as a place near Tufts or near the Mystic River. That undersells it.
