- **Transparency:** Does the website publish their home edge and the RNG (Random Number Generator) code?
- **Community Reputation:** Are there countless genuine reviews on third-party online forums like Trustpilot or Reddit?
- **Age of the Site:** Sites that have been operational for five or more years are statistically less most likely to be "exit frauds."
- **Accountable Gaming Tools:** Do they provide deposit limits, cooling-off durations, or self-exclusion alternatives?
