

Boise has a habit of surprising people. On paper, it is Idaho's capital, a growing inland city with a strong business base and a steady stream of newcomers. On the ground, it feels more layered than that. You can spend a morning walking the greenbelt with coffee in hand, an afternoon at a museum or stadium, and the evening at a summer festival where the whole city seems to show up. That mix of outdoor access, neighborhood character, and civic energy gives Boise its appeal, but it also shapes the practical side of living here.
