

Medford does not try too hard, and that is part of its appeal. Tucked just north of Boston, it has the feel of a city that has grown up alongside the region rather than being polished into something artificial for visitors. Its streets carry the weight of 17th-century settlement, Revolutionary-era memory, college energy, neighborhood-scale commerce, and the practical concerns of a modern suburb that still values its older homes.
