The amperage draw for mini splits, even 110V units, can lead to voltage drop, overheating, and fire hazards if plugged into anything other than a dedicated outlet.

To safely install a 110V mini split, you need a dedicated 15A circuit wired with a pigtail plug cable rated for at least 15 amps. This cable must include three wires:

- **Power (hot)**
- **Neutral**
- **Ground**

Having these three components is critical — some cheaper competitors skimp on grounding, which is not acceptable per electrical code and voids warranties. Confirm the pigtail plug cable specifications before purchase.
