

Lula, Georgia has the kind of character that does not announce itself loudly, which is part of its appeal. The town sits in northeast Georgia with a pace that feels personal, shaped by railroad history, small businesses, family neighborhoods, and the practical rhythms of a place where people still notice their neighbors' porches, driveways, and roofs.
