- **Trade-Ups:** Players can trade 10 skins of a particular wear tier for one skin of the next greater tier.

Understanding Skin Wear and Rarities

Not all skins are created equal. The visual quality and market worth of a skin depend heavily on 2 main factors: **Rarity** and **Wear Condition**.

Weapon Rarities

Rarity determines the standard drop rate of a skin. Valve uses a color-coded tier system to categorize products:

Color	Code	Rarity	Tier	Description
Blue	Customer/ Industrial/ Mil-Spec	The most common tier. Usually comprises the bulk of random drops and lower-tier case contents.		
Purple	Restricted	Unusual skins with more elaborate		

designs. **Pink** Classified Uncommon skins that are greatly searched for by collectors. **Red** Covert Exceptionally unusual weapons. The majority of renowned rifle skins fall into this classification. **Gold/ Special** Extraordinary The rarest tier, solely booked for knives and unusual glove variations.

Use Conditions (Float Values)

Every skin is assigned a floating-point number between 0.00 and 1.00, called the **Float Value**. This number figures out how worn or scratched the weapon appears.

Use Condition Drift Value Range Visual Appearance **Factory New (FN)** 0.00-- 0.07 Pristine, flawless finish with minimal to no scratches. **Minimal Wear (MW)** 0.07-- 0.15 Minor acnes or scratches, usually near the edges. **Field-Tested (FT)** 0.15-- 0.38 Obvious wear and tear, however the art work stays mostly undamaged. **Well-Worn (WW)** 0.38-- 0.45 Significant scratches and dulling of colors. **Battle-Scarred (BS)** 0.45-- 1.00 Heavily used, rusted, or scraped. (Note: Some specific skins look deliberately cool when battle-scarred, making the nickname "Blackimov").

The Virtual Economy: Why Are Skins So Expensive?

To an outsider, spending hundreds and even thousands of dollars on a digital gun texture seems ridiculous. However, the CS: GO skin economy operates on core financial concepts of supply and need, shortage, and utility (social status).

Aspects Influencing Skin Prices:

1. **Supply and Demand:** If a case is ceased, the supply of its skins stops growing. As the player base broadens, need increases, driving prices up.
2. **Float and Pattern Templates:** Some skins feature algorithmic patterns. For example, the *AK-47|Case Hardened* has different amounts of blue coloring depending upon its pattern index. A "Blue Gem" pattern can command astronomical rates.
3. **Professional Play (Esports):** When an expert player uses a particular skin throughout a significant tournament, demand for that skin typically spikes overnight.
4. **Sticker labels and Souvenirs:** Applying professional tournament stickers to a weapon or owning a souvenir bundle from a Major can dramatically change its value.

Noteworthy High-Value Sales

The market has seen deals that rival real-world luxury goods. Uncommon knives integrated with low float worths or particular patterns have actually cost numerous thousands of dollars. Notable historic examples consist of:

- **AWP|Dragon Lore (Factory New, Souvenir):** Signed by expert gamers, these have actually traded hands for over £ 100,000.
- **StatTrak™ M4A4|Growl:** Due to a copyright problem, this skin was pulled from drop pools early in its life, making it incredibly rare and valuable.
- **Blue Gem Karambit (Case Hardened - Pattern 388):** Rumored to have actually been valued at over £ 1.5 million, representing one of the most expensive digital products in gaming history.

Dangers and Precautions in the Skin Market

- **Valve's Trade Restrictions:** To fight scams, Valve carried out a 7-day trade hang on freshly acquired or traded products, indicating you can not instantly flip products without waiting a week.
