- **Watch the Weekly Reset:** Facepunch updates the main Item Store every Thursday. Buying directly from the store is generally cheaper than purchasing immediately after on the secondary market.
- **Usage Third-Party Price Trackers:** Sites like Skinport, DMarket, and Steam Inventory Helper enable you to track historic pricing information to guarantee you aren't overpaying.
- **Beware of Scams:** Because high-tier Rust skins can be worth numerous dollars, targeted phishing scams are common. Never click suspicious trade links or log into unverified third-party trading websites.
- **Build Around a Theme:** Instead of buying random private pieces, choose a color palette (e.g., all red, all black, or neon green) and build a cohesive set over time.

- **Repair work Benches:** If you discover a generic item in the world or loot one off an opponent, you can take it to a Level 1, 2, or 3 Workbench together with a **Repair Bench**. For a small material charge, you can reskin the item to match your personal collection.
