2. Update Graphics Drivers

Advanced Solutions for Persistent Crashes

Run an SFC Scan (System File Checker)

Corrupted Windows system files can interrupt DirectX and other APIs needed by CS: GO.

1. Press the Windows Key, type cmd.
2. Right-click **Command Prompt** and select **Run as administrator**.
3. Type sfc/ scannow and press Enter.
4. Let the scan total, reboot your PC, and test the game.

Change Virtual Memory (Pagefile)

Running out of RAM or Virtual Memory can cause abrupt crashes mid-game. Making sure Windows manages your pagefile automatically can prevent this:

1. Press the Windows Key, type **Advanced system settings**, and open it.
2. Under the **Advanced** tab, click **Settings** under the Performance section.
3. Go to the **Advanced** tab again and click **Change** under Virtual memory.
4. Guarantee **Automatically handle paging file size for all drives** is inspected.

Test for Hardware Instability

If your CPU or RAM is aggressively overclocked (through XMP/EXPO or manual tweaks), the Source engine can be notoriously conscious instability.

- Temporarily disable XMP/DOCP in your BIOS to see if crashes stop.
- Run a stress test program like Prime95 or MemTest86 to inspect for faulty hardware elements.
