Field-Tested (FEET) 0.15-- 0.38 Visible scratches and use, but the artwork remains largely undamaged.
Well-Worn (WW) 0.38-- 0.45 Substantial wear, heavy scratches, and noticeable paint fading.
Battle-Scarred (BS) 0.45-- 1.00 Heavily distressed, rusted, or scraped; often sought after for distinct appearances.

Beyond exterior wear, skins can also have a **StatTrak™** module (which tracks validated kills with that specific weapon, marked by a small digital counter) or be designated as **Souvenirs** (dropped during official Valve-sponsored esports competitions, featuring gold team and occasion stickers).

The Economics of the Steam Marketplace and Third-Party Sites

The CS2 economy operates just like a real-world stock exchange. Prices are dictated entirely by supply and demand, rarity, and community understanding.

Why Are Some Skins Worth Thousands of Dollars?

1. **Rarity:** Skins are categorized by tiers (Consumer, Industrial, Mil-Spec, Restricted, Classified, Covert, and Special/Exceedingly Rare). The drop rates for high-tier products, specifically knives and gloves, are infinitesimally little.

4. **Float Extremes:** Some collectors pay massive premiums for items with incredibly low float worths (e.g., 0.000 x) or exceptionally high drifts where the weapon looks completely rusted away (called "Blackiimovs" on the AWP Asiimov).

Popular Platforms for Trading and Buying

While players can buy and offer products directly on the main **Steam Community Market**, funds are locked within the Steam environment and can not be cashed out to a checking account. Consequently, a robust third-party ecosystem has emerged.
