1. The Sticking Door

Humidity changes typically cause wood doors to swell, making them stick in their frames. Alternatively, loose hinge screws can cause the door to droop.

- **Step 1:** Inspect the hinges. Tighten up any loose screws. If the screw holes are removed, remove the screws, insert wood glue and toothpicks into the holes, let dry, and re-insert the screws.
- **Action 2:** If the door still sticks, locate the binding point by moving a notepad along the space.
- **Step 3:** Sand or plane the high spot down. Re-seal or paint the exposed wood to prevent wetness absorption.

2. Squeaky Hinges

A squeaking hinge is an easy repair that yields immediate satisfaction.

- **Step 1:** Open the door and location a wedge beneath it for stability.
- **Action 2:** Tap the hinge pin upward using a hammer and a nail or punch tool.
- **Step 3:** Clean the pin with a wire brush or rag, use a lube (such as white lithium grease, petroleum jelly, or silicone spray-- avoid cooking oils that bring in dust), and tap the pin back into place.

3. A Loose or Misaligned Latch

When a door fails to stay shut, the latch bolt is likely missing the strike plate.

- **Step 1:** Apply lipstick to the latch bolt and close the door. The lipstick will leave a mark on the door frame, showing where the latch is hitting.
- **Action 2:** Adjust the strike plate by loosening it and submitting down the hole, or moving it a little up or down to align with the mark.

Typical Window Issues and How to Fix Them

1. Drafty Windows

Drafts indicate degraded weatherstripping or failed caulking around the window frame.

- **Action 1:** Inspect the outside border of the window. If the old caulk is cracked or missing out on, scrape it away, tidy the area, and use a fresh bead of exterior-grade silicone caulk.
- **Action 2:** For double-hung windows, change damaged V-strip or foam weatherstripping along the sashes to develop a tight seal when closed.

2. Stuck Single or Double-Hung Windows

Paint accumulation or dirt tracks can glue a window shut.

- **Action 1:** Run an energy knife carefully around the perimeter of the sash to break any seals formed by dried paint.
- **Action 2:** Tap carefully along the frame with a rubber mallet to loosen the wood or vinyl.
- **Action 3:** Clean the tracks completely and apply a silicone-based lube to help the window slide smoothly.

3. Foggy Double-Pane Glass

If condensation appears *in between* the 2 panes of a double-pane (insulated glass) window, the seal has actually stopped working. Regrettably, this normally needs replacing the glass unit (IGU) rather than the entire window frame.
