

Markham, ON Climate Overview

Markham, Ontario lies within **York Region**, to the northeast of Toronto, and its **continental climate** creates real seasonal swings through the year. Because it is farther inland than places along **Lake Ontario**, Markham often seems a bit less moderated than shoreline communities. That means colder winter nights, warmer summer afternoons, and a local rhythm driven by changing **weather patterns** across the GTA.

This is the time of year when **frost** can appear, leaves begin their **leaf drop**, and residents should be aware that the **first snowfall** of the season is not far away.

Cold-Season Conditions: December to February

The winter months in Markham is marked by **snow**, freezing nights, and repeated shifts in storm systems.
