- **Gem Knives (Ruby, Sapphire, Black Pearl):** Specific Doppler knife finishes where the blade is totally covered in a single shade, without the standard various colored swirls.
- **Blue Gems (Case Hardened):** Case Hardened patterns can range from mainly gold to almost totally strong blue. A Tier-1 "Blue Gem" Karambit or AK-47 can command six-figure sums due to the fact that the chances of rolling that precise pattern index are astronomically low.

3. Low Float Extremes

Every skin in CS2 has a "Wear Rating" or "Float Value" ranging from 0.00 to 1.00.
