- **Gem Knives (Ruby, Sapphire, Black Pearl):** Specific Doppler knife surfaces where the blade is entirely covered in a single shade, devoid of the basic multicolored swirls.
- **Blue Gems (Case Hardened):** Case Hardened patterns can vary from mainly gold to nearly entirely strong blue. A Tier-1 "Blue Gem" Karambit or AK-47 can command six-figure amounts due to the fact that the odds of rolling that precise pattern index are astronomically low.

3. Low Float Extremes
