What is a CS: GO Case?

A CS: GO case is a virtual container that holds a randomized weapon skin, a knife, or gloves. To open a case, gamers require two things:

Rarity Tiers

Common	White	N/A	(Found in drops, not cases)	
Industrial Grade	Light Blue	N/A	(Found in drops, not cases)	
Mil-Spec	Blue	~ 79.92%	The most typical product discovered in cases.	
Limited	Purple	~ 15.98%	Uncommon, typically much better designs.	
Classified	Pink	~ 3.2%	Rare, highly desired weapon finishes.	
Covert	Red	~ 0.64%	Extremely rare, flagship weapon skins.	
Special (Exceedingly Rare)	Gold	~ 0.26%	Knives or gloves (the ultimate prize).	

Use Conditions (Float Values)

Aside from rarity, every skin is appointed a **Float Value** in between 0.00 and 1.00, which determines its physical wear and tear.

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07

- **Very Little Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15
- **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15-- 0.38
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.44
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.44-- 1.00

Keep in mind: Some skins are "wear-capped," suggesting they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower-float variations incredibly valuable.

The Mathematics of Opening Cases

It is clear that the odds are greatly stacked in favor of your home (Valve). While the specific algorithms are exclusive, community-driven data collection involving countless opened cases has actually provided us an extremely accurate photo of the stats.



- **StatTrak Probability:** For any item dropped, there is a roughly **10% possibility** that it will feature the StatTrak innovation, which tracks the variety of kills made with that weapon.
- **The Gold Dilemma:** The possibility of unboxing a knife or set of gloves sits at around **0.26%**. To put that into point of view, you would statistically need to open nearly 400 cases to see a single gold product-- with no warranties that it will be an important one.

Popular Misconceptions About Case Odds

- **"It will arrive at a knife!"** The outcome of a case is figured out the exact millisecond you click "Open." The spinning wheel animation is simply cosmetic and designed for suspense.
- **Hot and Cold Streaks:** Case openings are independent analytical occasions. Previous failures do not increase future chances.

Types of CS: GO Cases

Key Categories of Cases:

1. **Operation Cases:** Released during significant video game events (e.g., Operation Bravo, Operation Broken Fang). These often include special weapon finishes and command higher prices once the operation ends.
2. **Standard/Community Cases:** Regular updates that introduce community-voted skins (e.g., Chroma Case, Dreams & Nightmares Case).
3. **Terminated (Rare Drop Pool) Cases:** Older cases that no longer drop actively after basic matches. Instead, they drop at an incredibly low rate to a portion of gamers, causing their market worth to skyrocket over time.

Why Do People Buy Cases?
