4. **Well-Worn (WW):** Float 0.38-- 0.45. Significant paint cracking and heavy wear patterns.

5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** Float 0.45-- 1.00. Greatly deteriorated, sometimes looking rusted, weathered, or almost entirely removed of paint.

Keep in mind: Certain skins-- such as the popular AWP|Asiimov-- do not spawn in Factory New condition, making their lowest possible wear states extremely unusual and valuable.

How the Economy Works

The economy surrounding these digital possessions runs similarly to a real-world stock exchange. Prices are dictated simply by supply and demand, affected by several key elements:

- **Pro Player Usage:** If a popular esports expert starts using a particular skin during a significant competition, the demand for that product generally surges over night.
- **Case Availability:** As Valve stops dropping particular older cases actively, the supply of those cases-- and the skins consisted of within them-- decreases, triggering prices to rise organically gradually.
