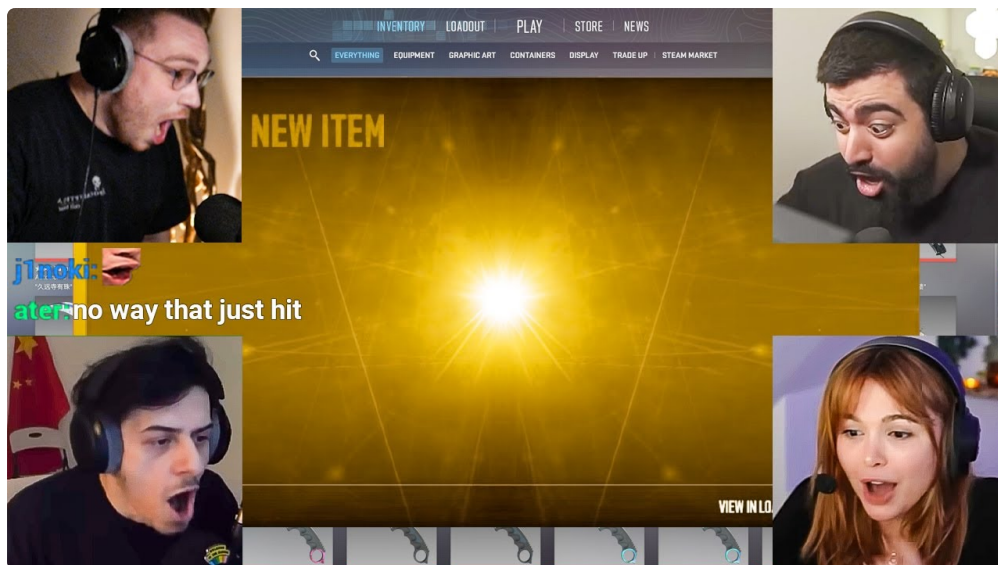

- **Crazy Mode:** Multipliers and unique events are activated randomly, including a component of disorderly luck to the result.
