Condition Name	Float Value Range	Visual Description
Factory New (FN)	0.00-- 0.07	Beautiful condition with little to no noticeable scratches or use. Normally commands the greatest cost.
Minimal Wear (MW)	0.07-- 0.15	Small imperfections, slight scratches, or small paint breaking, frequently only noticeable upon close examination.
Field-Tested (FEET)	0.15-- 0.38	Noticeable wear and tear, scratches on the body, and fading colors. This is the most common condition.
Well-Worn (WW)	0.38-- 0.44	Considerable wear, heavy scratches, and notable paint loss around the edges and high-friction locations.
Battle-Scarred (BS)	0.44-- 1.00	Extremely worn, greatly faded, and in some cases considerably changed look. Some collectors specifically look for severe BS drifts for a "blackimov" effect.

Beyond basic wear, some skins likewise feature a **StatTrak**™ innovation module, which tracks the number of eliminates a gamer gets with that particular weapon, including a radiant orange digital counter to the body of the gun.

The CS2 Skin Economy: How Value is Determined

Unlike cosmetic items in lots of other modern-day computer game, CS2 skins possess real-world financial value because they are fully tradeable and marketable. Gamers can purchase, sell, and trade products through the Steam Community Market or through reputable third-party marketplaces utilizing genuine currency or cryptocurrencies.

Several aspects determine the price of a CS2 skin:

1. **Rarity:** Classified by color tiers-- Consumer (white), Industrial (light blue), Mil-Spec (dark blue), Restricted (purple), Classified (pink), Covert (red), and Extra-Ordinary (gold/yellow for knives and gloves).
