StatTrak™ and Souvenirs

- **StatTrak™:** Items with this innovation feature an orange LED counter that tracks the number of validated eliminates made with that particular weapon.
- **Souvenir Packages:** These are dropped during main Valve-sponsored esports competitions (Majors) and feature gold sticker labels representing the groups and MVP of the round.

The Rarity Tiers

Valve organizes CS2 skins into standardized rarity tiers, which dictate how frequently they drop in-game or emerge from weapon cases.

1. **Customer Grade (White):** Common, basic drops.

2. **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly much better than Consumer, common in containers.
3. **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** Standard lower-tier case drops.
