What Makes a CS: GO Skin Rare?

3. **Pattern Indexes:** Many skins (like Case Hardened or Slaughter) make use of a paint seed system. This indicates the pattern is mapped in a different way onto the weapon depending upon its pattern index, leading to special variations-- such as the desired "Blue Gem."
4. **Discontinuation:** When Valve gets rid of a case from active drop pools or ceases a collection, the supply becomes finite, triggering costs to increase as demand persists.
5. **Stickers and Souvenirs:** Tournament mementos and weapons embellished with rare, discontinued stickers (like Katowice 2014 holo stickers) can multiply a skin's standard worth exponentially.

The Holy Grails: Most Legendary Rare CS: GO Skins

Specific skins have transcended the game to end up being digital folklore. Below are some of the rarest and most expensive skins in CS: GO history.

1. AWP|Dragon Lore (Souvenir)

Undoubtedly the most popular skin in the game, the Dragon Lore includes a mythical monster breathing fire across its body. While basic Factory New versions command huge sums, the **Souvenir Factory New Dragon Lore** from significant competitions (especially signed by gamers like Tyler "Skadoodle" Latham from Boston 2018) are ultra-rare.

- **Approximated Value:** £ 150,000+

2. StatTrak™ M4A4|Wail (Factory New)

The Howl is distinct because it is the only "Contraband" quality product in the video game. Soon after its release in 2014, Valve found that the art work was plagiarized. Valve right away eliminated the case, changed the artwork, and upgraded the existing M4 Howls to "Contraband" status, halting any [Find more information](#) new drops forever.

- **Estimated Value:** £ 30,000 to £ 100,000+ (depending on stickers and wear)

3. AK-47|Case Hardened (Pattern 661 - "The Blue Gem")

While the Case Hardened finish is common, specific pattern design templates include practically 100% strong blue on the leading publication and receiver. Pattern index 661 in Factory New condition is commonly thought about the supreme AK-47 skin.



- **Estimated Value:** Estimated to be worth upwards of £ 400,000 to £ 500,000 based upon recent personal collector deals.

4. Karambit|Case Hardened (Blue Gem - Pattern 387)

Similar to the AK-47, the Karambit Case Hardened with pattern index 387 includes a totally blue playside. A pristine Factory New version of this knife is held by a single collector who famously declined a EUR1.2 million deal.

- **Approximated Value:** Priceless/ Over £ 1,000,000
