- **Esports Betting:** Traditional sports wagering, however particularly for professional CSGO matches (ESL Pro League, Majors, etc), allowing users to wager skins or cash on match results, map winners, and tournament champs.

- Imposing 7-day trade holds on traded items.

- Mass-banning hundreds of bot accounts related to gambling networks.
- Issuing cease-and-desist letters to popular platform operators.

Players caught using their main Steam accounts for high-risk automated trading associated with gambling sites run the risk of receiving long-term [Visit this page](#) trade bans, rendering their valuable stocks untradeable.
