Understanding Rarity Tiers

Valve classifies skins into unique rarity tiers, which determine how frequently they drop or are unboxed from cases. Knowing these tiers is important for comprehending a skin's baseline value.

Beyond these basic tiers, weapon finishes also feature **StatTrak™** technology (which tracks the variety of kills made with that specific weapon, marked by a digital counter on the gun) and **Souvenir** variations (dropped during official esports tournaments).

Use Conditions and Float Values

A significant aspect in a skin's look and rate is its **Wear Condition**, frequently described as the float value. The float value is a decimal number ranging from **0.00 to 1.00** that identifies how scratched, worn, or faded a texture appears.

The five official wear conditions are:

1. **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07-- Looks pristine, though some skins can still have small scratches even at 0.00.
2. **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15-- Slight signs of wear, generally minor scratches on the publication or edges.
3. **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15-- 0.38-- Noticeable wear and tear, but the overall artwork stays intact. This is the most typical condition traded.
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45-- Significant wear, with big parts of the paint scraped away or faded.
5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00-- Heavily harmed. Some skins go through enormous visual transformations at this stage, often looking completely rusted or weathered.

Note: Certain skins are "float-capped," meaning they can not exist in specific conditions. For example, a particular skin may be capped at a minimum float of 0.06, making Factory New the only high-tier condition readily available.



The Economics of CS: GO Skins

The marketplace surrounding these virtual products is regularly studied by economic experts and financial analysts. Since Valve enables peer-to-peer trading and third-party cash-out sites, skins work likewise to stocks or rare art. A number of crucial chauffeurs dictate skin costs:

- **Supply and Demand:** If a case is stopped and stops dropping, the supply of its skins freezes while need might continue to rise, increasing prices.
- **Pro Player Influence:** When a famous esports expert utilizes a specific skin during a major tournament, its appeal and price often rise overnight.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can sell ten skins of one rarity tier for one skin of the next greater tier from the very same collection, affecting the flow of high-end items.
- **Stickers and Patches:** Applying rare competition stickers (such as Kato '14 holos) to a weapon can dramatically increase its total worth, depending on the buyer.

Tips for Buying, Selling, and Trading
