

Why ants are a frequent issue in Hamilton homes

Caulking is one of the most important long-term fixes. Sealing cracks around windows, trim, plumbing lines, and baseboards helps block entry points. Professional help is also crucial when there is a risk of **structural damage**. Carpenter ants can damage wood over time, especially in damp areas.
