- **Round Handicap:** Betting on a team to cover a spread of rounds (e.g., -3.5), indicating they must win the map by a minimum of 4 rounds.

4. Overalls (Over/Under)

This market concentrates on the total variety of rounds played in a map or the total number of maps played in a series.

- **Over/Under Maps:** Betting whether a series will end in 2 maps (Under 2.5) or go to a 3rd map (Over 2.5).
- **Over/Under Rounds:** Predicting whether the map will be a blowout (Under 26.5) or a long, drawn-out affair (Over 26.5).

Competition Outrights

This involves betting on the ultimate winner of a major event, such as a PGL Major or an Intel Extreme Masters (IEM) competition. While these bets can take days or weeks to resolve, they provide considerable odds compared to individual match-winners.

Strategic Considerations for CS2 Betting

Success in CS2 wagering is hardly ever about luck; it is about information analysis and situational awareness. To prosper, one need to keep an eye on several key signs:

1. **The Veto Process:** Before every map, teams participate in a "veto procedure," banning and choosing maps. Understanding which teams are strong on particular choices is essential. If a group is required to play a map they dislike, their chances of winning drop considerably.
2. **Roster Changes:** CS2 is a team video game that depends on chemistry. Even a world-class group can falter after changing a single gamer. Keep a close eye on "stand-ins" or roster mixes, as these typically disrupt the circulation of a group.
