2. Operation Bravo Case

Launched along with Operation Bravo, this case featured the legendary **AK-47|Fire Serpent** and the **Desert Eagle|Cobalt Disruption**. It remains among the most in-demand collector products in the game.

3. Chroma Case Series

Introduced in 2015, the Chroma cases brought bright, futuristic finishes to the video game and debuted brand-new knife types, including the Karambit, M9 Bayonet, and Butterfly Knife variants with marble and Doppler finishes.

4. Prisma Case Series

Known for presenting dynamic, colorful skins like the **M4A4|Emperor** and the **Five-SeveN|Angry Mob**, Prisma cases likewise featured the Horizon knives with desired surfaces like Emerald and Sapphire.
