Layout Options

Based on the size of the crowd and the type of the occasion, alternative arrangements might provide superior sightlines. A jutting dais, which protrudes into the crowd, permits attendees to be seated on three sides, augmenting the quantity of excellent lines of sight. An in-the-round layout, where the stage is in the center, provides complete surrounding visibility but necessitates careful oversight of entry points, departure routes, and scenic elements. A U-shape or horseshoe layout can work well for panel dialogues and exhibitions where the crowd is more modest.
