The Economics of CS2 Skins

4. Underage Gambling

- **API Restrictions:** Valve introduced trade holds and limited the functionality of automated trade bots to make skin transfers more cumbersome.
- **Mass Ban Waves:** Periodically, Valve restricts numerous accounts associated with popular gambling bots, resulting in millions of dollars worth of digital assets being completely locked out of blood circulation.

In spite of these efforts, developers of gambling sites continuously adjust by moving domain names, presenting cryptocurrency options, and utilizing decentralized peer-to-peer trading systems to bypass Valve's constraints.
