Detailed DIY Door Repairs

1. Repairing a Sagging Door

- **Step 5:** Reattach the hinge using longer screws that can bite into the stud behind the door frame.

2. Getting rid of Squeaks

- Open the door and tap the hinge pin up using a nail and a hammer.
- Clean the pin tidy with a rag to remove old, dirty grease.
- Coat the pin gently with a multi-purpose lube or petroleum jelly.
- Reinsert the pin and swing the door backward and forward a couple of times to disperse the lubricant.

3. Changing a Misaligned Latch

If your door declines to stay shut, the lock isn't aligning properly with the hole in the strike plate.

- **The Lipstick Trick:** Rub a bit of lipstick or chalk on the door lock. Shut the door and attempt to latch it. The mark left on the door frame will show you precisely where the lock is hitting.
- **The Fix:** Use a file to widen the strike plate hole, or unscrew the strike plate and move it a little up or down to match the latch.
