The Regulatory Crackdown and Evolution

The unregulated nature of early skin gambling developed a wild west environment. Minors easily accessed these platforms, and many scandals involving rigged chances, covert ownership of sites by popular influencers, and match-fixing plagued the market.

Valve [CS2 Gambling Site](#) eventually took definitive action. In 2016, the game designer issued cease-and-desist letters to lots of skin gambling websites, blocking their automated Steam accounts from trading. This briefly maimed the industry, but operators quickly adjusted.

The Shift to Cryptocurrency

When direct Steam-bot trading became hard to keep, platforms rotated. Modern sites began making use of cryptocurrencies (such as Bitcoin, Ethereum, and Tether) together with standard fiat payment methods.
