How Skins Enter the Game

When a skin is eliminated from the main store, its supply ends up being finite in terms of main sales, shifting the characteristics totally to the secondary market.

- **Radiance Factor:** Skins that radiance in the dark (frequently referred to as "GITD" skins) are traditionally amongst the most sought-after items in the game because they offer presence during pitch-black in-game nights.
