Prize	Numerous gamers deposit skins into a common pot. A spinner picks a winner based on the percentage of their contribution. Winner-take-all format where bigger depositors have higher chances, but smaller sized depositors can still win.	

The Technology Behind CS2 Casinos: Provably Fair Gaming
