A virtual coin is flipped, and the winner takes the whole pot. 50/50 odds, minus a little platform commission (rake). **Prize** Several gamers contribute skins to a main pot. Each skin's value identifies the player's "ticket" share. A spinner chooses one winner who takes whatever. Based on the overall value contributed; platform takes a portion cost.
