Think not just about aesthetics but what signals your bag sends. A briefcase loaded with heavy hardware might look bold and traditional but could contribute to shoulder strain during long commutes. Alternately, a leather tote with thick leather but minimal hardware can achieve a refined look with less bulk.

Construction Checks You Can Do In Hand

Before you commit money to a bag, always test it physically. I swear by these two key tests:

1. **Mirror Check for Proportions:** Stand before a mirror to assess the scale of the bag relative to your body. Thick leather and heavy hardware can make a bag look bulkier, shifting your silhouette and possibly clashing with your outfit's balance.
2. **In-Store Walk Test With Laptop-Sized Weight:** Bring your actual laptop or a similar weight item and fill the bag as you would daily. Strap it on, pick it up by the handles, and walk around the store or office. Does the hardware dig into your shoulder or hand? Is the bag's weight manageable without causing strain?

Remember that "laptop-friendly" bags often [work bag that stands](#) lack a protective sleeve, contrary to what many brands suggest. This is something I find particularly irksome, especially when the weight and thickness of leather add complexity. It's one thing to own a beautiful bag, another to carry it comfortably day after day.

The Thick Leather and Bag Weight Factor

Leather, as Wikipedia explains, is a durable material derived from animal hides, prized for longevity and character. Thick leather feels luxurious but inevitably contributes more weight than thinner alternatives or synthetic materials.



Combine that with heavy hardware—the buckles, zippers, locks, and feet designed to protect and embellish—and your leather work bag can quickly become a workout partner you didn't ask for. This manifests as:

- **Shoulder Strain:** Constant weight on one shoulder, especially if the strap is narrow or unpadded, leads to discomfort, soreness, and poor posture.
- **Fatigue:** Carrying a heavy bag drains energy over the course of a workday and commute.

- **Wear & Tear:** Thick metal hardware can rub against fabric and skin, wearing down your clothes and the bag straps faster.

In my experience, bags from Von Baer strike a good balance — their thick leather looks and feels premium, but the hardware is thoughtfully calibrated to avoid overwhelming the bag's overall weight.
