The Wear and Tear System: Float Values Explained

Among the most fascinating aspects of CS: GO skins is that no 2 similar weapons look exactly the exact same. Every weapon is appointed a **Float Value** ranging from **0.00 to 1.00**, which determines its physical condition or outside wear.

The wear worth is completely locked to the item when it is produced and does not break down further through usage.

1. **Factory New (FN):** Float 0.00-- 0.07. Beautiful, perfect surface with minimal to no scratches.
2. **Very Little Wear (MW):** Float 0.07-- 0.15. Minor scuffs or small scratches, usually only visible upon close examination.
3. **Field-Tested (FEET):** Float 0.15-- 0.38. Noticeable wear and scratches, stabilizing price and visual fidelity.
4. **Well-Worn (WW):** Float 0.38-- 0.45. Considerable paint chipping and heavy wear patterns.

- 5. **Battle-Scarred (BS):** Float 0.45-- 1.00. Heavily degraded, sometimes looking rusted, weathered, or practically entirely stripped of paint.

Note: Certain skins-- such as the popular AWP|Asiimov-- do not spawn in Factory New condition, making their lowest possible wear states exceptionally uncommon and important.

How the Economy Works

The economy surrounding these digital possessions runs similarly to a real-world stock market. Costs are determined purely by supply and demand, affected by several essential aspects:

- **Pro Player Usage:** If a prominent esports expert starts utilizing a particular skin during a major competition, the demand for that item typically increases over night.
- **Case Availability:** As Valve stops dropping particular older cases actively, the supply of those cases-- and the skins consisted of within them-- decreases, triggering rates to rise organically gradually.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can trade in ten weapons of one rarity tier for one weapon of the next higher tier, burning products out of circulation and permanently changing supply chains.
- **Operation Releases:** Valve-sponsored operations present new thematic collections, briefly flooding or moving the focus of the marketplace.
