percentages above represent the "base" opportunity per opening. The real "Blue Gems" (Gold tier) are incredibly unusual, typically approximated at less than 0.0001% for specific high-tier knives.

How the Opening Mechanic Works

When a player clicks "Unlock," the game generates a random number. This number correlates to a particular product within the case's swimming pool.

Drift Value & StatTrak

A crucial element in determining a skin's worth is its **Float Value**. This is a number between 0 and 1 that represents the wear and tear of the weapon:

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00 - 0.07
- **Very Little Wear (MW):** 0.07 - 0.15
- **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15 - 0.38

- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38 - 0.45
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45 - 1.00

Additionally, some skins come with a **StatTrak™** counter, tracking the variety of eliminates made with that weapon. StatTrak versions are generally more costly than their standard equivalents.

One of the most Popular and Valuable Cases

Not all cases are developed equal. Older cases, or those consisting of famous skins like the "Fade" **Visit the website** or "Case Hardened" Blue Gems, command huge costs on the Steam Community Market.

1. **The CS: GO Weapon Case # 1:** The original case. Prices fluctuate greatly however are typically extremely high due to nostalgia.

- **Average Cost to Open:** £ 3.00 (Key) + £ 0.50 (Case) = **£ 3.50**
- **Typical Return:** Typically hovers around £ 0.80 to £ 1.50, suggesting the home (Valve) and the market normally earnings.

Most players will get "scrap" (Consumer or Mil-Spec skins) worth cents. However, the adventure of the "roll" and the possibility of landing a Covert or Gold product keeps the economy alive. For investment functions, buying the case straight is frequently much safer than spending for the secret to open it.

Supply and demand. Older cases are no longer stopped by the game, making them limited. If they include a desirable skin (like the R8 Fade), the price stays high due to rarity.
