4. Payment The winner is declared, and all items from both pools are transferred to the winner's website inventory. **Winner!** Gets products worth £ 22.90 overall. **Loser.** Gets absolutely nothing.

Popular Game Modes in Case Battles

- **Free-For-All (FFA):** Four players get in, but only one walks away with the whole loot stack.

- **Terminal/Sudden Death Battles:** If a tie occurs, a tie-breaker round figures out the winner.

- **Utilize Free Promos Wisely:** Many respectable sites provide daily bonuses, rakeback, or small sign-up balances. Using these can extend playtime without dipping even more into personal funds.

Risks and Considerations

- **Financial Risk:** The home edge ensures that, over a large sufficient sample size, the platform constantly wins. Losses can build up really rapidly.
