

A good air conditioner does not just cool a house. It steadies the whole rhythm of daily life. Ductwork problems, poor insulation, and thermostat placement can all play a role. This issue becomes especially frustrating in homes where the thermostat says one thing and the lived experience says another. Odors can be just as revealing. A musty smell may point to moisture or mold in the system or ductwork. A burning smell is more urgent and should never be brushed off. If the air from your vents has started to smell stale, sour, or metallic, something is wrong enough to investigate immediately.

These warning signs do not always mean replacement is necessary, but they do mean the system needs attention.
