The Mechanics Behind the Scenes: Provably Fair Gaming

To combat suspicion and develop trust amongst users, trusted CSGO gambling sites execute a system called **Provably Fair**.

This cryptographic technology enables players to individually validate that the result of every video game is genuinely random and has actually not been controlled by the house.

- **How it works:** Before a round begins, the server generates a secret "server seed" and hashes it, showing the hash to the player. The gamer's internet browser creates a "client seed." When integrated with a nonce (a counter), these three aspects figure out the video game outcome.
- **Verification:** After the round concludes, the unhashed server seed is exposed. Gamers can plug these variables into a confirmation tool to prove the house didn't alter the outcome midway through.
