1. Exterior Wear Conditions

A skin's exterior condition does not degrade through usage; rather, it is arbitrarily designated when the skin is unboxed or dropped, and it remains fixed forever. The five official wear conditions are:



- **Factory New (FN):** Pristine condition with little to no visible blemishes.
- **Very Little Wear (MW):** Slight scratches or minor paint breaking, usually only noticeable upon close examination.
- **Field-Tested (FT):** Moderate wear; noticeable scratches and fading on the weapon's body.

- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** Extreme wear. The weapon often looks battered, rusted, or badly faded, though certain skins actually look appealing in this condition (typically referred to as "black-grind" or "battle-scarred gems").

2. Weapon Rarities

Skins are [Get more information](#) categorized into various rarity tiers, which determine their drop rates in-game or from weapon cases:

Rarity Tier Color Code Description **Customer Grade** White Typical, fundamental weapon surfaces. **Industrial Grade** Light Blue Slightly uncommon drops. **Mil-Spec** Dark Blue Basic tier found in many weapon cases. **Restricted** Purple Higher-tier products, often working as trade-up food. **Categorized** Pink Unusual, highly in-demand weapon surfaces. **Covert** Red The greatest standard weapon tier in cases (excluding knives/gloves). **Extraordinary** Gold Very rare items, including Knives and Gloves.

Drift Values and Pattern Indices

Beyond wear conditions, 2 surprise technical metrics greatly influence a skin's price: **Float Value** and **Pattern Index**.

- **Drift Value:** A decimal number between 0.00 and 1.00 that determines the specific wear of a skin. For instance, a skin may be "Field-Tested," but if its float is 0.1501, it is best on the border of Minimal Wear and will command a greater cost than a Field-Tested skin with a float of 0.37.
- **Pattern Index:** Many skins feature procedural generation, implying the texture is mapped in a different way depending on a seed number (1 to 1000). Famous examples consist of the *Case Hardened* series, where particular seed numbers develop vast quantities of blue on the weapon surface ("Blue Gems"), driving prices up tremendously.

How to Acquire CS2 Skins

There are several primary techniques for constructing a CS2 inventory, each with its own advantages and disadvantages:

1. **In-Game Drops:** Simply playing on official or neighborhood servers grants weekly care packages containing weapon drops, graffiti, or cases.

- **Usage Steam Guard:** Always have two-factor authentication allowed through the Steam Mobile Authenticator.
