1. Minor Gambling

Because CS: GO is rated Mature (M) for violence, it attracts a huge audience of teenagers and minors. This enabled millions of minor players to bet valuable digital assets without parental oversight or legal barriers.

2. The "SkinsBet" Scandals and Influencer Marketing

- **Protect minors:** Parents should monitor their kids's Steam stocks and restrict access to unapproved third-party trading websites.
