- **How it works:** Players set an automated cash-out at a very low multiplier, such as 1.05 x to 1.10 x.
- **The Catch:** While you will win the large majority of rounds, a single unforeseen 1.00 x crash (which takes place periodically) will wipe out dozens of small wins immediately.
