Once a skin is removed from the main shop, its supply becomes limited in regards to primary sales, moving the characteristics completely to the secondary market.

Among the most remarkable aspects of Rust is its robust, Steam-integrated economy. Similar to *Counter-Strike 2*, skins hold real-world financial value. Players can buy, offer, and trade skins on the Steam Community Market or by means of respectable third-party trading sites.

Numerous factors dictate the cost of a Rust skin:

- **Supply and Demand:** Skins released years ago in restricted amounts typically command huge cost.
- **Popularity:** Items that are aesthetically pleasing or meme-worthy naturally increase in value.
- **Youtuber/Streamer Influence:** When a popular Rust content developer utilizes a particular skin, its rate often spikes overnight.

- **Glow Factor:** Skins that glow in the dark (often referred to as "GITD" skins) are historically amongst the most desired items in the video game because they supply presence throughout pitch-black in-game nights.

1. Camouflage Skins

- **Snow Camo:** Whites and light grays for the northern ice biome.
