Rarity Tiers and Weapon Grades

CS2 skins are categorized by rarity. The color of the item's name tag in the stock shows its tier. Higher rarities are tremendously harder to pull from cases, increasing their market worth.

- **Customer Grade (White):** Common, basic drops.
- **Industrial Grade (Light Blue):** Slightly less common base weapons.
- **Mil-Spec (Dark Blue):** Standard drop swimming pool for a lot of weapon collections.
- **Limited (Purple):** Often features striking artwork; utilized regularly in trade-up agreements.
- **Categorized (Pink):** Highly sought-after designs that work as the centerpiece for lots of loadouts.
- **Covert (Red):** The highest basic weapon tier. These are uncommon, highly detailed, and typically expensive.
- **Extremely Rare (★ Gold/Yellow):** Knives and gloves. These are the crown gems of the CS2 economy.

Pattern Indexes and Special Features

Beyond wear conditions, some skins include **Pattern Indexes** (ranging from 1 to 1000). Depending on the pattern template designated to the weapon upon generation, the visual texture might shift considerably.

Famous Pattern-Based Skins:
