



Most homeowners do not think much about their drains until something slows down, backs up, or starts to smell. That is usually when the problem has already moved beyond a minor nuisance. A sink that takes an extra minute to empty, a shower pan that holds water around your ankles, or a kitchen drain that gurgles after the dishwasher runs are not random household quirks. They are early warning signs.

In some situations, they do little more than sit against the blockage and attack nearby pipe material, especially in older plumbing systems or with certain types of plastic piping. Even when they do not cause immediate damage, they can weaken seals, contribute to corrosion in metal lines, or create a hazardous environment for the next person who opens the drain.
