- **Coinflip:** A direct player-versus-player (PvP) video game mode where two users wager equal quantities of skins or credits. A virtual coin is flipped, and the winner takes the whole pot.
- **Jackpot:** Multiple gamers pool their skins into a single pot. The higher the worth of the skins a user contributes, the higher their percentage opportunity of winning the whole built up pot.

Security, Legality, and Risks

Since CS gambling mainly exists in a regulative gray location, users must exercise severe care. Valve, the developer of *Counter-Strike*, has historically broken down on third-party gambling by mass-banning bot accounts used for trading skins.

- **Volatility of Skin Prices:** The real-world value of CS skins fluctuates based on supply, demand, and Valve updates. A skin worth £ 100 today may be worth £ 80 next week.
- **Frauds and Fraud:** Fraudulent clone sites often mimic legitimate platforms to steal Steam qualifications and stock products. Always double-check URLs.
- **Lack of Consumer Protection:** Unlike controlled, land-based casinos or licensed online sportsbooks, unregulated third-party sites provide little to no legal option if a platform closes down or keeps funds.

Best Practices for Safe Participation

- **Enable Steam Guard:** Always use two-factor authentication (Steam Guard Mobile Authenticator) to protect your account versus unapproved trades.
